News From John Calvo


Herricks retiree John Calvo and wife Nina Calvo are into our second retirement. That is, selling our last motorhome after 47 years of traveling by motorhome. Our adventures took us to Alaska before the Alaskan Highway was paved (1122 miles) plus 800 more miles of gravel out of 11,500 miles. Our emergency tire kit consisted of a tire probe with a slot to hold a rubber plug at the end and glue. It worked just fine for two flats until we managed to purchase new tires. We went back after 29 years to dip our feet in the Artic Ocean via the pipeline road. Our adventures in all 50 states took us numerous revisits to national parks, 5 mi. round trip hike in & under glacier on Mt. Rainer. It melted out in the 1980's. There were 25 permanent glaciers, now 19. Managed to hike many trails in swamps (Okefenokee our favorite), forests, mountains, desert terrains, caves (some can be 3 miles), Canada: 4,900 miles of Tarns Canadian Highway, Yellowknife, Wood Bubalo National Park in Northwest Territories, Yukon, British Columbia including Vancouver Island twice, Canadian (Continued Pg. 5)

Book Review – Paul Wolski

In When America Stopped Being Great: a history of the present (2021) Nick



Bryant, a teenage emigrant from Britain, educated in America and seasoned BBC correspondent, explains the roots of today's political polarization in his adopted country. Bryant presents a review of presidents and their administrations from 1980 to 2020, examining the language, behaviors and policies of each president, including Reagan, George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton, George W. Bush, Obama and Trump. The author is surprisingly balanced, never betraying partisan prejudice. I kept waiting for the shoe to drop, but Bryant constructed his arguments slowly and with care, always emphasizing how decisions about language and action gradually shape reality. Each presidential administration did its part to fuel

polarization and the "us versus them" vision. Was the process fully conscious? Were the consequences foreseen? Have the past forty years been "the frog in the gradually warming water" experience? The answer is for the reader to decide. Sadly, Bryant ends on a note of disappointment: he has presented causes but can offer no path to solutions. We have our homework assignment.

Celebrate Retiree Recognition Day - Oct. 21!

They phone bank, rally, fundraise and are always willing to lend a helping hand. They're NYSUT retirees and this year the statewide union set aside a special day to say thanks.
